LITURGY OF THE WORD

First Reading

A reading from the 1st Corinthians 12:4-11:

Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of services, but only one God is served; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. To one is given through the Spirit the utterance of wisdom, and to another the utterance of knowledge according to the same Spirit, to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by the one Spirit, to another the working of miracles, to another prophecy, to another the discernment of spirits, to another various kinds of tongues, to another the interpretation of tongues. All these are activated by one and the same Spirit, who allots to each one individually just as the Spirit chooses. *Leader:* The word of the Lord. *All:* Thanks be to God

Gospel (Luke 6:30-31)

A reading from the holy gospel according to Luke:

Give to everyone who asks you, and if everyone takes what belongs to you, do not demand it back. Do to others as you would have them do to you.

(Placing your right hand in the palm of your left extend your hands to receive the blessing)

Leader: O, Holy God, Bless these hands that they may continue to be a blessing to others. Amen.

<u>All</u>: Holy God, may your presence be in all that I do. Renew in me awareness of your sustaining love that touches me each day, opening the eyes of my heart to see that you touch the world through the work of my hands. Amen.
