OPCN Develops Health Services Delivery Framework for Palliative Care

Over the last year, the Ontario Palliative Care Network (OPCN) has been working with partners to develop a Health Services Delivery Framework (HSDF) that will recommend a model of care for delivering high quality, culturally safe palliative care in Ontario.

The HSDF is intended for all those who provide or plan care for patients with life-limiting illness and includes system planners (e.g. MOHLTC, LHINs, and Regional Palliative Care Networks), providers (e.g. physicians, nurses, allied health) and provider agencies (e.g. contracted nursing agencies, community service agencies, and hospices). The implementation of HSDF is expected to improve patient experience, increase access to palliative care services, and optimize the use of healthcare resources.

In January 2018, an initial version of HSDF recommendations was shared with OPCN's Advisory Councils, Regional Palliative Care Networks, and other stakeholder organizations for input. Extensive feedback was received from across the province with a majority of respondents offering an overall positive response for the vision and direction of HSDF. The document was revised based on the feedback received and resulted in another draft being circulated for review in summer 2018.

The North West LHIN Regional Palliative Care Program engaged with stakeholders across the Northwest to collect and collate feedback from our region that was then forwarded on to

OPCN. The final version of the HSDF is expected to be released in March 2019. At that point, OPCN in collaboration with the Regional Palliative Care Networks will then undertake a current state assessment to determine readiness of sites within regions to implement HSDF recommendations.

The Regional Palliative Care Program is well positioned to test the Health Service Delivery Framework model of care, to deliver culturally safe care to people of Northwestern Ontario.

Regional Education Update - CERAH

The session, presented by Jill Marcella and Kimberly Ramsbottom, North West LHIN Regional Advance Care Planning (ACP) and Health Care Consent (HCC) Champions, provided health care providers with practical skills related to ACP and HCC to improve patient care. To assist with consolidating information (and to have a lot of fun in doing so!) participants engaged in a boisterous game of ACP/HCC Jeopardy! Participants also worked through case studies to apply their knowledge and were each provided with ACP/HCC resource packages. Nineteen attendees took part in the Marathon CoP event and feedback indicated attendees thoroughly enjoyed the day. As a result of this event, the PCEdCoP recruited 15 new members in the east and an encore presentation of this workshop is being offered on November 20th in Thunder Bay!

The purpose of the PCEdCoP is to share knowledge, experience, and resources so that each individual can practice more effectively. Two face-to-face PCEdCoP events are held each year (one in the region and one in Thunder Bay) to bring members together for networking, resource-sharing, and an educational opportunity. These events are also a great way to recruit new members interested in palliative care.

NORTH WEST IDEAS TEAM

This year the Ontario Palliative Care Network partnered with Health Quality Ontario (HQO) to offer quality improvement training to each Regional Palliative Care Program through the Improving and Driving Excellence Across Sectors (IDEAS) program. IDEAS is a 7-month applied learning program consisting of 3 in-person learning sessions in Toronto and weekly meetings with a Quality Improvement advisor.

Members of the North West IDEAS Team included Hilary Mettam and Marlene Benvenuto from the Regional Palliative Care Program - St. Joseph's Care Group, Beverley Kelley from the North West LHIN, and Karen Roberts from Thunder Bay Regional Health Sciences Centre.

With guidance from the RPCP Advisory and local palliative care clinicians, the North West IDEAS Team decided to focus its project on improving communication and coordination amongst the providers of individuals living in community with complex care needs. Working with the QI advisor, the team explored this issue further and identified several potential "change ideas" that could be tested on a small scale using the Plan, Do, Study, Act (PDSA) approach.
